



This visit will be a complete change of scenery from Bangkok and the usual locations visited by urban Thais and foreign visitors, giving us all an insight into rural life in a sustainable environment.

About Khao Hin Sorn Royal Development Learning Center

Located 90km east of Bangkok in Chachoengsao Province, Khao Hin Sorn is a 303ha site, demonstrating a variety of sophisticated agricultural, animal husbandry and water management techniques combined to achieve an ecological balance. Established in 1979, it was the first of the 6 study centers set up across Thailand by His Majesty King Bhumibol Adulyadej as integrated models to rehabilitate eroded soil, to reforest and to make the land highly productive again on an ongoing, sustainable basis.

The land the Center now occupies was an arid, unfarmable area, wasted by uncontrolled deforestation and overuse of pesticides - the typical side effects of cash-crop style of production. This now flourishing productive area serves as a training center promoting all aspects of agriculture, such as cultivation techniques, propagation of crop varieties, animal husbandry, fishery, etc. to farmers in the surrounding villages for application on their own land, and also to farmers in other areas. Both farming and processing techniques are covered to enable farmers to make a better living from their labours.

The Center also conducts ongoing research to improve and refine farming techniques and to achieve productive yields, following the principles for land management according to the concepts of the Sufficiency Economy.

The Sufficiency Economy Philosophy (SEP)

The SEP was fully developed by His Majesty as a means of leading his country out of the 1997 Asian crisis and has been implemented across many sectors of Thai society.

Sufficiency thinking is intended as a virtues-and science-based decision-making framework or foundation that can be applied to all spheres of life. It is underscored by sets of practical work principles that suggest appropriate ways of actually behaving. Sufficiency thinking further foresees measurable economic, societal, environmental and cultural outputs that are kept in balance.

However, the ultimate outcomes envisaged are overall wellbeing and sustainability, which include being self-reliant, immune against hardships, resilient should hardships occur, adaptable and, above all, happy.
